Brainfuse is a homework help website where students and tutors can meet in the Brainfuse Online Classroom. There tutors guide students through homework challenges and help them develop the necessary skills to complete assignments on their own. But that is just the beginning of what Brainfuse has to offer students and adults.

Brainfuse offers live skills tutoring and an extensive library of Brainfuse-created lessons and videos tutorials that can be accessed when the tutors are offline or if the student just needs a little more information on the subject. There are games and quizzes that the student could customize by just uploading the list of words or material needed to be studied and then "play" their way into remembering it all. In addition, SkillSurfer contains hundreds of practice tests in a wide range of subjects. Along with the normal subjects, SkillSurfer offers practice tests for:

- The new SAT
- ACT
- The new GED
- TASC (a GED alternative test)
- HiSet (a GED alternative test)
- GRE
- GMAT
- ASVAB

- TOEFL
- TOEIC
- US Citizenship Test Course: (including practice tests and lessons)

Once the practice test is taken, the student can see what areas of the test they need help on and either use the online lessons and videos or access a tutor for more help.

Brainfuse also has a Writing Lab where a student can upload a paper they are writing to have the tutors look over it and given them suggestions on areas of their paper, including voice, fluency, organization, and word choice.

20 HALLOWEEN FACTS

- Because the movie Halloween (1978) was on such a tight budget, they had to use the cheapest mask they could find for the character Michael Meyers, which turned out to be a William Shatner Star Trek mask. Shatner initially didn't know the mask was in his likeness, but when he found out years later, he said he was honored.
- 2. The first Jack O'Lanterns were actually made from turnips.
- 3. Halloween is the second highest grossing commercial holiday after Christmas.
- 4. The word "witch" comes from the Old English wicce, meaning "wise woman." In fact, wiccanwere highly respected people at one time. According to popular belief, witches held one of their two main meetings, or sabbats, on Halloween night.
- 5. Samhainophobia is the fear of Halloween.
- Fifty percent of kids prefer to receive chocolate candy for Halloween, compared with 24% who prefer nonchocolate candy and 10% who preferred gum.
- 7. The largest pumpkin ever measured was grown by Norm Craven, who broke the world record in 1993 with a 836 lb. pumpkin.
- 8. Trick-or-treating evolved from the

ancient Celtic tradition of putting out treats and food to placate spirits who roamed the streets at Samhain, a sacred festival that marked the end of the Celtic calendar year.

- "Souling" is a medieval Christian precursor to modern-day trick-ortreating. On November 1, the poor would go door-to-door offering prayers for the dead in exchange for soul cakes.
- 10. The first known mention of trick-ortreating in print in North America occurred in 1927 in Blackie, Alberta, Canada.
- 11. Cats have a prominent place in Halloween folklore and decor
- "Halloween" is short for "Hallows' Eve" or "Hallows' Evening," which was the evening before All Hallows' Day or All Saints Day on November 1.
- 13. Ireland is typically believed to be the birthplace of Halloween.
- 14. Scarecrows, a popular Halloween fixture, symbolize the ancient agricultural roots of the holiday.
- 15. Halloween has variously been called All Hallows' Eve, Witches Night, Lamswool, Snap-Apple Night, Samhaim, and Summer's End.
- 16. Looking in a mirror at midnight on Halloween was thought to reveal a

boyfriend's face.

- Mexico celebrates the Days of the Dead (Días de los Muertos) on the Christian holidays All Saints' Day (November 1) and All Souls' Day (November 2) instead of Halloween. The townspeople dress up like ghouls and parade down the street.
- 18. Dressing up as ghouls and other spooks originated from the ancient Celtic tradition. The Celts believed that disguising themselves this way would allow them to escape the notice of the real spirits wandering the streets during Samhain.
- 19. Halloween is thought to have originated around 4000 B.C., which means Halloween has been around for over 6,000 years.
- 20. Teng Chieh or the Lantern Festival is one Halloween festival in China. Lanterns shaped like dragons and other animals are hung around houses and streets to help guide the spirits back to their earthly homes. To honor their deceased loved ones, family members leave food and water by the portraits of their ancestors.
